### **November Club Meeting**

Thanks to the efforts of Harold Cohen, our November meeting was held at the Frost Farm Village Meeting House, in Sudbury, MA. Members attending included: Lou Hills, Harold Cohen, Mike Hale, Arthur Perlmutter, Gaspar LaColla, Bill Michaels, Shaun Kimball, Bob Okerholm, Bob Prezioso, and Alan Katz. Alan is a former member who is re-joining-- Welcome back, Alan!

Our first order of business was to elect the club officers for 2017. Once that was done, we moved on to other business:

Dumas Boats had sent along a video on Model Boating, some catalogs, and a door prize.
 We all enjoyed watching the 15 minute video, even though it was filmed in the late
 1980s! (They were originally going to send us an updated version, but it wasn't finished in time.)

- Lou Hills did a very interesting demo on rope serving. (This is wrapping a ship's heavy shrouds or other rigging with a lighter weight line to protect it from the elements.) More on the demo elsewhere in this issue.

 Shaun Kimball brought along a rough-looking hand-me down lobster boat hull that is is going to convert to a recovery barge. Shaun's plan is to outfit it with outriggers and tow it with his tug, to snag disabled models.

— Bill Michaels brought along the new Revell of Germany 1/144 scale Flower Class Corvette kit. This is a brand new model, just released a couple of months ago. It is much more accurate and detailed than the old Matchbox 1/72 scale kit of the ship. Bill pointed out how cutting scale in half resulted in a model one-eighth the size of the 1/72 scale kit. The smaller model is 17 inches long, with a 3 inch bean, and only displaces about 11 ounces, which is 1/8<sup>th</sup> the larger model's displacement of 5.5 pounds.



Bill Michaels won the door prize donated by Dumas-- a 1940 19' Barrel Back kit in 1/24 scale. With too many projects in the "to build" pile already. Bill is donating the kit to the door prize raffle at the Holiday Dinner.

## **Serving and Tarring Shrouds**

The 1840s tug that Lou is modeling was built in East Boston during the transition period between steam and sail power. Lou is currently making the standing rigging for his 1:32 radio control scale model. At the meeting, Lou demonstrated his approach to serving and tarring the shrouds. He also illustrated steps in making 20 lignum vitae (a type of wood) deadeyes, and fabricating 10 metal chain plates and 10 deadeye metal straps. Following his talk Lou answered several questions.

Lou is not one to tell others how to model-- he didn't want anyone to be put off by his "from scratch" approach. As he said after his presentation, there are much easier and faster ways to do all of this-- just buy black rope, walnut deadeyes and chain plates; or for that matter buy one of the wonderful model boat kits currently on sale with all the parts. However, being now retired, Lou seems to be marching to a different drummer. Lou said he just hopes he finishes his model and gets it in the water in our lifetime! (As do the rest of us!)
