## **Salem Maritime Festival**

The Festival was a two-day event this year, held on August 5-6 in the usual place on Pickering Wharf in Salem, MA. It was another great event, with lots of members turning out to help. The event organizers had planned to offer a series drawings for free boat rides at the Festival. But a lot of people who had signed up left early because of the rain. As a result, anyone who had entered the drawing was able to go for a one-hour cruise around the harbor. Linda Arini and Johanna Okerholm ended up going for a sail on the schooner *Ardelle*. Your Editor, wife Kaja, and Charlie Tebbetts went out on the research boat. While Linda and Johanna were sailing about, we went out and pulled a lobster trap to see what was there.

Last month, I reported that the UK publishing company Traplet had gone bankrupt. In addition to publishing Marine Modeling International magazine (now gone), Traplet was also the company to whom Model Boats Magazine had outsourced their plans sales operations. When Traplet shut down in July, it took the Model Boats plan service website down too. (The publishers of Model Boats said at the time that it would take some time to get the service back in operation.)

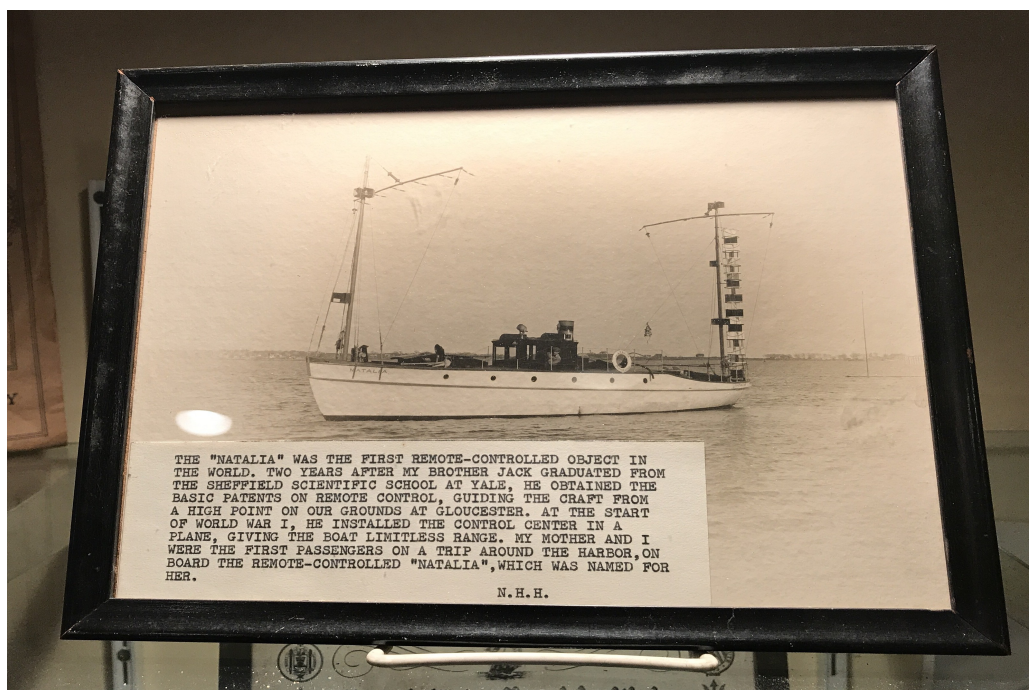
But the plans for both magazines are available once again. On September 8<sup>th</sup>, Cornwall Model Boats announced that they are now carrying the huge library of MMI and MB plans. Also, Sarik Hobbies announced that they will also be carrying the entire line. (Both outfits are in the UK.) This is good news for modelers, as this was a huge number of popular RC boat plans.

**Dick Schafer** sent me the following:

I was visiting the Hammond Castle and Museum in Gloucester in early August and stumbled upon this photo of the First RC Boat - in 1:1 Scale! John Hays Hammond (although he did design, build, and play an organ, he was not "the" Hammond of Hammond Organs) was an inventor and early pioneer in Radio Control. Many of his patents and designs are on display in this eccentric castle comprised of 14th, 15th, and 16th century design elements. The Hammond Castle is located off Rt 127 in the Magnolia section of Gloucester.

He also fitted remote control to a 1:1 Battleship, which he navigated from shore to evade 84 out of 86 bombs dropped from (piloted) aircraft. Unfortunately the guns had been removed or he might've shot down a few planes!

Here's the picture of the Natalia, the world's first RC boat, that Dick sent along:




